Uriel Iñiguez To report complaints: 1-800-423-7233  Danny Aguilera Email: Agua235@lni.wa.gov	<ul> <li>Everyday there are 2 interviews throughout the state on the radio advising the community about COVID-19, worker rights, and how to report violations (via the 1-800 number to the left)</li> <li>Complaints have been received and if required there have been investigations</li> <li>You can call and file a complaint on behalf of a worker</li> <li>In order for action to be taken, complaints/reports need to be made to the L&amp;I number         <ul> <li>Number staffed w/ Spanish speakers as well (can report in Spanish)</li> </ul> </li> <li>Discussions with the Governor's office about the costs for Agriculture cost</li> </ul>
Questions from Callers	<ul> <li>What about implementation? Protective gear? Masks, gloves? Is there a way Labor and Agriculture are making farm owners accountable to provide basic protection (beyond standard norms)?         <ul> <li>We are not going to issuing it because there has not been a requirement of adding masks but enforcing what has been issues as of now</li> <li>Enforcing the Governor's issuance</li> <li>Lack of materials is an issue bigger than state agencies</li> </ul> </li> <li>We are hearing that farmworkers do not have access to water to wash their hands; they are being told to bring their own water?         <ul> <li>If this is happening, call the 1-800 number</li> <li>Required by law to respond to every complaint within 24 hours</li> </ul> </li> <li>Workers are being told there will be 2-3 workers per table, some unable to eat at the tables. What can LNI do to ensure workers are getting their true lunch break?             <ul> <li>If not receiving their lunch can be reported to LNI</li> <li>The employer expectations is to keep people separated, how they do it is up to the employer</li> <li>Cannot dictate to the employer how they separate lunch breaks or reduce groups etc.</li> </ul> </li> <li>What is the filing complaint process?         <ul> <li>Safety complaint: you don't have to provide your name – all that's needed is the address and name of the company</li> <li>Labor law complaint: you DO have to provide your name because it affects your wages</li></ul></li></ul>

Ignacio Marquez Email: <u>imarquest@agr.wa.gov</u> Phone: (509) 895-9878	<ul> <li>WSDA role is to regulate food safety laws</li> <li>Labor related issues are taken care of when we do training and worker protection inspections related to pesticides – only time they're involved with workers</li> <li>They are receiving questions but they are referring them to L&amp;I or DOH</li> <li>Industries responsible for complying with the Governor's orders – not allowing face to face meetings or group gatherings</li> <li>Seasonal employees 750 but some are on the fields but there is a wide range</li> <li>We send email blasts to the industry to remind them about food safety laws         <ul> <li>Last email had links on reminding them to keep their place clean</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
Questions from Callers	<ul> <li>What about implementation? Protective gear? Masks, gloves? Is there a way L&amp;I and Agriculture are making farm owners accountable to provide basic protection (beyond standard norms)?         <ul> <li>If the employee is applying a pesticide the employer is supposed to comply with the label – has not changed from the past</li> </ul> </li> <li>What more can agencies do to push/enforce worker protection?         <ul> <li>While agencies have to "stay in their lane," willing to partner up with other agencies about getting the word out to get worker protection out</li> <li>We have to respect other agencies that have jurisdiction over workplace standards or workplace health</li> <li>Open to any ideas as long as it stays within they are tasked to do</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

Skagit, Whatcom and surrounding areas	<ul> <li>Over 140 cases of COVID-19</li> <li>Lots of information coming out but still needs to be disseminated in indigenous languages</li> <li>How do we qualify farmworker kids to receive free childcare?</li> <li>Farmworkers saying that a local worker was diagnosed with COVID but employer did not give out information/guidance         <ul> <li>Employer said they could take PTO for 2 weeks if they had PTO, or non-paid time off but not employment because they are essential work</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
Clark and surrounding areas	<ul> <li>Need of information for small businesses of the help they need and what they can provide for their employees</li> </ul>
King and surrounding areas	<ul> <li>Community concern of how to pay for housing/rent</li> <li>Rental assistance for undocumented community</li> <li>Employers are held responsible of their employees and employees holding their employers responsible</li> <li>Are house cleaners essential? Landscapers? Lots of uncertainty if a job is essential or not</li> </ul>
Snohomish	<ul> <li>Lots of English information but needs to be in Spanish</li> <li>How can CHA &amp; other agencies partner up to make the documents accessible for our community</li> </ul>
Community Reports: Central/Eastern WA	Notes
Grant, Douglas, Chelan, and surrounding areas	<ul> <li>Workers' rights – similar concerns regarding safety and health of our farmworkers</li> <li>Education – making sure we are reaching out to our community that is culturally relevant using radio or TV         <ul> <li>Using visuals</li> <li>Access and outreach communications</li> </ul> </li> <li>Local funds – planning to see what we can do to figure out what local funds are available in our region to support our farmworkers</li> </ul>
Yakima Valley, Tri-Cities, and surrounding areas	<ul> <li>Urgent need for migrant community – we still have time to act before the virus spreads over the mountains         <ul> <li>There needs to be more of a systemic approach</li> <li>Top-down decision and implementation needs to happen</li> </ul> </li> <li>Teamsters &amp; UFCW representing workers but there are some who not represented         <ul> <li>Worksites need to have a system to give other workers to have protection if someone is diagnosed with the virus</li> <li>Testing needs to be available now in these worksites and areas of WA</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
